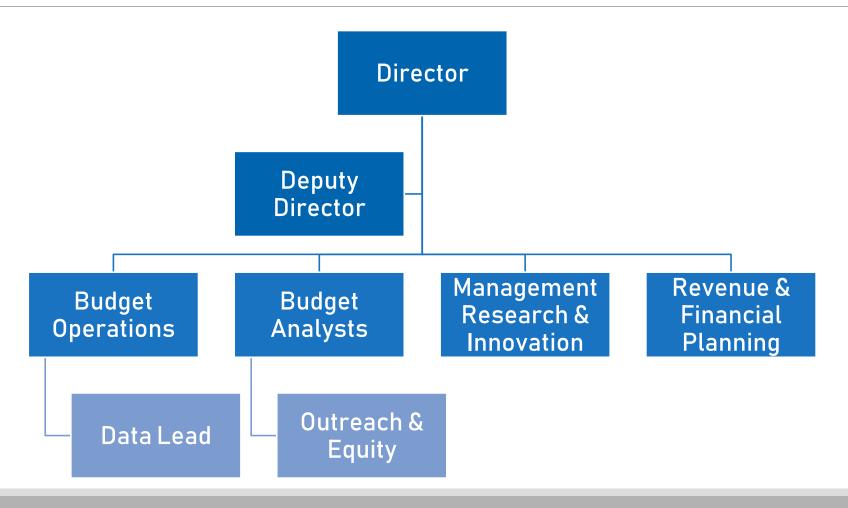


BBMR Mission

Prioritizing community engagement and outreach, as well as transparency and accountability with two new positions

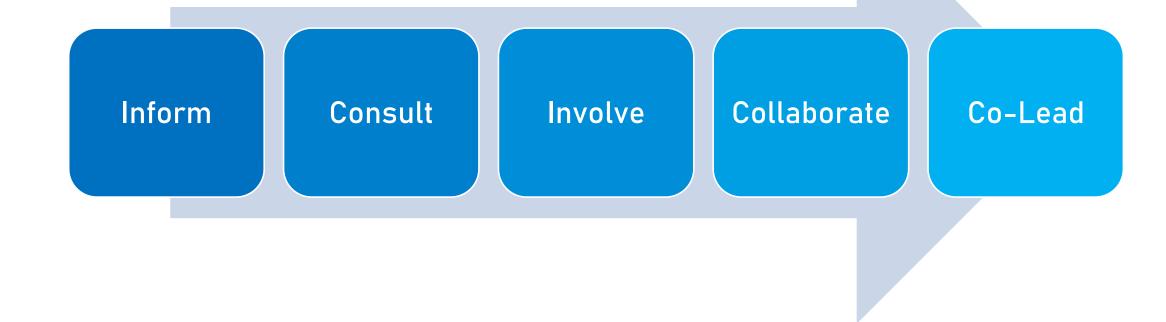
Assessing resident participation since FY2016

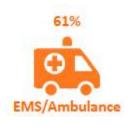
Community Survey

- Asking residents:
 - Which services they consider most important
 - How satisfied they are with specific City services
 - What factors contribute to their quality of life
 - How likely they are to continue living in Baltimore, and factors influencing that decision
- Results feed into Agency Performance Measures



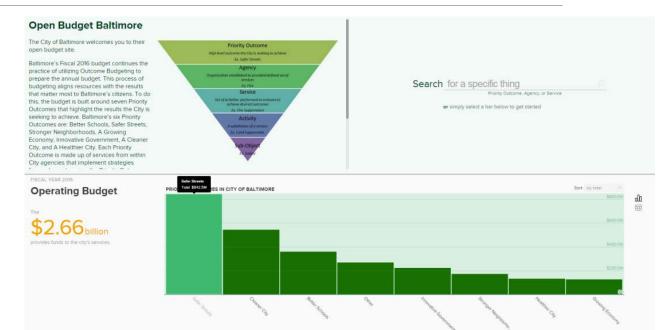

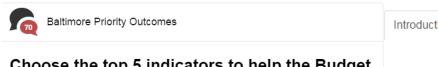

Baltimore's budget is created using a model known as Outcome Budgeting, an innovative process that aligns City resources with desired results.

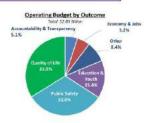
Under this process, we organize the budget around the City's priority outcomes - the results that matter most to citizens

- . Measure performance
- . Reward innovation . Enhance the transparency of the budget

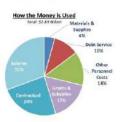
Our ultimate goal is to combine strategic planning. performance management, and Outcome Budgeting in a omprehensive program for good governance.

The Mayor's Office of Sustainable Solutions (MOSS) CitistatSMART Division works closely with the Bureau of the Budget and Management Research (BBMR) to hold agrecies accountable for tracking performance and demonstrating alignment with strategic goals.

in Fiscal 2018, the new MOSS-CitistatSMART team aunched a comprehensive review of all service-level erformance measures citywide. The review will be completed by the end of Fiscal 2019.





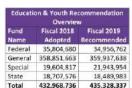

BUDGET BASICS



Key budget decisions for Education & Youth in Fiscal 2019 include:



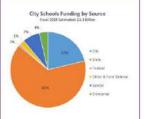
. School Funding: Fiscal 2019 marks the second installment of a three-year City commitment to help stabilize City Fiscal 2018 Fiscal 2019 Schools' finances, while the State considers changes to the Adopted Recommended school funding formulas. The City has pledged \$90 million 34,956,762 above the Fiscal 2017 baseline over the three-year period.

359,937,638 • Maintenance of Effort for Schools: Total City support to 21,943,954 City Schools exceeds \$370 million. City funding supports 18,489,983 Maintenance of Effort payments, the 21st Century School 432,968,736 435,328,337 Modernization fund, teacher pension costs, retiree health

benefits, and school health and crossing guard services. Capital funding will increase by \$2 million, from \$17 million to \$19 million, to assist City Schools with building and maintenance issues.

. Youth Fund Contribution: Fiscal 2019 will mark the second year of Charter-required contributions into the Children and Youth Fund. The Fiscal 2019 contribution is \$12.3 million.

· Library Upgrades: In January 2018, with increased funding from the State and City, the Library expanded library hours by 30%, with all neighborhood branches opening at 10 a.m., six days a week. Central Library renovations are expected to be completed in the first half of 2019, with new and improved spaces, technology upgrades, and safer/up-to-date facilities.

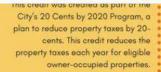

\$30,402,000 in tax credits estimated in Fiscal 2019.

HOMESTEAD TAX

This program protects residents from annual assessment increases. Residents do not have to pay property taxes on assessment value increases above 4%.

\$28,429,000 in tax credits estimated in Fiscal 2019.



A 10-year tax credit in designated State Enterprise Zones on the increased value of a commercial property after improvements.

\$23,441,000 in tax credits estimated in Fiscal 2019.

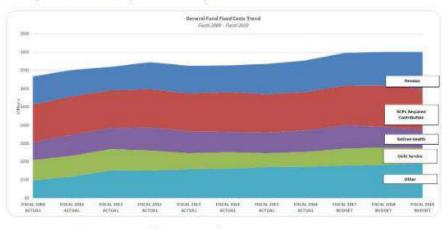

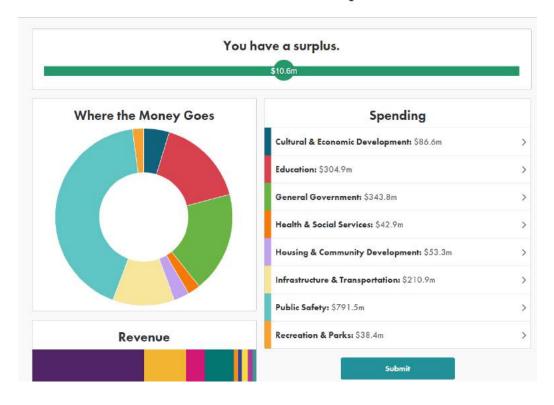

COMPARING BALTIMORE'S BUDGETS



The capital budget funds physical infrastructure.

This funding covers long-term projects, such as major renovations or replacements of infrastructure.

Capital funds cover projects like community center, road, and water system renovations and improvements.

The capital budget is funded by revenue funds, debt funds, and federal, state, and private funds.

The Department of Planning oversees the Capital Budget. earn more at planning baltimorecity gov

The operating budget funds the daily business of the City.

This funding covers City programs and services, as well as staff and supplies.

Operating funds cover services like bulk trash collection, traffic enforcement, and operation of pools and community centers.

The operating budget is funded by taxes, fees and fines, and federal, state, and private funds.

The Department of Finance oversees the Operating Budget.
